Week of February 26, 2023

1 John 2:20 You have an anointing from the Holy one, and all of you know the truth.

Have you ever been called a prophet, or a priest, or a king or queen? Probably not often. Most of us rarely think of ourselves that way. But God does. He lifts us up to live a full life of blessing and purpose.

What does it mean to be prophets, priests, and royal rulers in God's service? Jesus Christ, son of God the Father was anointed by the Holy Spirit. As the Bible teaches, Jesus is our chief Prophet. This means he fully reveals to us the will of God and how God calls us to live. Jesus is also our perfect High Priest, who gives us access to God and has delivered us through the one sacrifice of his life for us. Matthew 14:27 Take courage! It is I. Do not be afraid.

In 2011 I received a call from St. Mary's Emergency Department that my brother, John, had been admitted from his memory care facility after a sudden loss of consciousness. As I drove to Rochester, I prayed for healing for him and courage for me. I knew God would be with us and drew strength from an image that I had seen almost every Sunday for 18 years.

For generations, East St. Olaf Lutheran Church in rural Byron was where our ancestors had been baptized, confirmed and usually, married and buried. There is a beautiful icon on the altar of Jesus holding out his hand to Peter. You may remember the story of Jesus walking on the water to where his disciples were fishing. Peter asks Jesus to let him walk on the water also. Peter became afraid of the waves and wind and began to sink. Our Savior reached out his hand and caught him, returning Peter safely to the boat.

Since John's condition was terminal and he was totally unresponsive, the doctor admitted him to a private room where he would be kept comfortable and allowed to die peacefully. As I sat and talked to John about our parents, our life on the farm, our Norwegian Christmas dinners of lutefisk, etc., I was not afraid. I was assured that God was with us, and Jesus was holding out His hand to John as he slipped away. Because of Jesus' resurrection, we don't need to be afraid of dying or any other of life's difficulties. Jesus reminds us He is Here! Take courage!

Prayer: Dear Heavenly Father, remind us of your continued presence in our lives. Amen.

Matthew 4:17 Jesus began to preach, "Repent, the <u>kingdom of heaven</u> has come near."

Matthew 6:9-10 Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Health issues have a way of bringing us to our knees and seeking God's divine intervention in our lives. Such is my story of recent spiritual growth. While studying God's word through Dallas Willard's teachings, I have found peace and joy in my circumstances. I learned that the "Good News" is more than God loves me and Jesus died on the cross for the forgiveness of my sins. I learned Jesus came into the world so that I could trust Him and follow Him into the "kingdom of heaven" on earth **now.** Living in the kingdom requires surrendering my kingdom (my will) for God's Kingdom (God's will). I no longer need to have it my way. I can trade anxiety for peace. Kingdom living is walking in the character and power of God. It is having FAITH... confidence in God's goodness; HOPE... the joyous anticipation of good; and LOVE... simply the will for the good of others.

Living in God's kingdom leads us to a life we were designed to live. We grow in our awareness of God's GRACE - God's action in our lives, and KNOWLEDGE - a personal relationship with God, through prayer and studying His word. What I have found liberating is that Jesus' teachings focused on doing God's will rather than what not to do. When we armor ourselves with the character of Christ - that is doing what Jesus would do if He were us in a given situation, sin begins to lose its hold on us and doing the right thing becomes easier.

What I found in my studies was, no matter my circumstance and the gifts I have, I can come as I am and with the power of the Holy Spirit begin to step into "kingdom living" now. Things that have helped me on this journey are acknowledging God with praise & thanksgiving, relying on God's power in what I say and do, resting in the confidence of God's will/action in my life, focusing on what Jesus would do if he were me in my situation, and meditating on I Corinthians 13 and Colossians 3:1-17.

Prayer: Dear Heavenly Father, We thank and praise you for your love and sending your son Jesus to save us and show us how to live in your kingdom on earth. Send your Holy Spirit to guide and strengthen each of us on our journey to living in the "kingdom of heaven" now. Amen

Psalm 100:2 Worship the Lord with Gladness; come before Him with joyful songs!

I admit that I am not very disciplined in my prayer life, especially worshiping God. I don't have a specific time each day to read the Bible, or to meditate on His word. Like most Christians, I easily pray FOR something or to "Thank God" for blessings or answered prayers. I struggle to find the words to adequately praise and extol our Almighty God. I feel my words are insufficient. But I can SING His Praises.

I've not been blessed with a beautiful voice or much musical talent (I play a little piano gently for my own amazement!). However, I make a great loud "noise unto the Lord" when I'm in the car or alone at home. Singing along with wonderful songs such as "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" and "How Great Thou Art" is my kind of heartfelt worship.

This was never more special to me as when 40 fellow tourists gathered around a huge cistern in a WWII bunker on the north coast of Norway. We were visiting one of the many Nazi bunkers along the North Sea that the Germans had blasted out of the coastline in occupied Norway. The bunders were built by Jewish prisoners and when they died of starvation or maltreatment, their bodies were tossed into the sea. The huge cistern, now empty, was laid with rows of barbed wire, painted a bloody red. Our tour guide said, "Now we will sing a song to remember the people who died here" and she began "Amazing Grace..." and 41 voices, acapella, rose from that underground symbol of evil to praise the God who forgives, reconciles and loves. 41 faces stained with tears walked out into the sunlight when we had finished.

So I worship my God, our Creator, Savior and Spirit, in the words of a song and I am awed by His Amazing Grace and love for such as I.

Great and Gracious God, Thank you for all the blessings I have received and guide me in being a follower of your Son, Jesus. Amen
